

**NORTH RIDGEVILLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL  
MINUTES OF  
REGULAR MEETING                      MARCH 15, 2010**

**CALL TO ORDER:** 7:30 P.M.

President Corcoran: I call to order the North Ridgeville City Council Meeting of Monday, March 15, 2010. Please stand for the invocation and pledge of allegiance.

**INVOCATION:** lead by President Corcoran.

**PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:** by all.

**ROLL CALL:**

Present were Council Members Nancy Buescher, Dennis Boose, Richard Jaenke, Bob Olesen, Bernadine Butkowski, Roseanne Johnson and President Kevin Corcoran.

Also, present were Mayor David Gillock, Safety-Service Director Jeffry Armbruster, Law Director Andrew Crites, Engineer Larry Griffith, Auditor Chris Costin and Clerk of Council George Smith.

**MINUTES - Corrections (if any) and Approval:**

Council Minutes of regular meeting held March 1, 2010

President Corcoran: Are there any corrections to those minutes? Hearing none, the minutes are approved. Clerk, please read the other minutes.

Clerk of Council Smith: Please note:

Board of Zoning & Building Appeals minutes of regular meeting February 25, 2010;

Civil Service Commission Minutes of special meeting February 26, 2010; and

Planning Commission Minutes of regular meeting March 9, 2010.

**LOBBY:**

President Corcoran: We are at the lobby section of our meeting. This is the time where members of the audience are invited to address your City Council with one subject matter. Before stepping to the podium, please complete the form in the back of the room, because it will enable us to follow up with any questions or concerns that you may have this evening. Please understand that your questions will not be answered on the Council floor and therefore, it is important that you complete this form as we may not be able to reach you to provide answers if you do not. Please approach the podium, leave the form with Mrs. Buescher, and state your name and address for the record. You have three minutes to address Council.

1) Becky Campbell of 5425 Olive Street clarified the promise of land for the dog park by explaining that no where in their presentation or any of their conversations have they ever approached Council asking for money. The issue for them is wanting the commitment of the land for the proposed dog park.

Council Member Buescher stated that she read an article in the paper that gave her the impression that the City was going to be asked to provide 50,000 dollars. She asked if that was the case.

Mayor Gillock explained that they have put in a request. Representative Lundy came to them as he did two years ago when we received the funding for Olde Towne Theater and asked if there were any projects we might like to have considered for funding. He stated that they included the dog park along with a skate park and the trail for them to consider. If they just want to fund something, those were put on the list. He stated that they have not filed any formal applications for grants or anything else. He explained that it was just like they did with Olde Towne Hall, where he asked if the City would like to have funding, if they had money available.

Council Member Buescher thanked the Mayor for bringing that to her attention as she wasn't aware of that.

President Corcoran asked if there was anyone else in the audience that would like to speak.

2) Robert Gaydash of 9400 Avon Belden Road asked if there was a new rule that states there will be no questions answered during lobby.

President Corcoran explained that it would depend upon if Council had answers, but for the most part, Council may not be prepared to answer the questions.

Robert Gaydash asked why there was a Policeman in the room and if his name was connected to this. He addressed the Law Director and asked what the statute of limitations was on slander.

Law Director Crites explained what the President of Council has tried to explain by stating that what he, as a resident, is doing is letting Council know his concerns and if he would like to discuss those concerns in earnest, he is invited to call them during regular work hours. He continued to explain that he has asked Mr. Gaydash to do that in the past, when he spoke of his concerns regarding the land, but he never did. He again availed his office to Mr. Gaydash and his questions and asked that he contact him. He explained that today, they have a meeting to run, as it is not an exchange. He stated that he is definitely allowed to express his concerns.

Robert Gaydash stated that he would like his question answered as it related to the Policeman being present as he doesn't appreciate his good family name being dragged through the gutter in the eyes of the North Ridgeville Police Department. He explained that he prefers being on public record because he has had bad experiences behind closed doors.

Mayor Gillock explained that they have considered security issues for years. We've looked at installing detectors and doing a lot of different things. There is no particular reason why they are here and Mr. Gaydash's name isn't isolated as to why we have done this. He stated that we have seen what has happened in other cities and in other communities and they felt that it is time to include an Auxiliary Officer and have them attend the meetings. He further explained that the

City doesn't have the money to put in a metal detector or do some of the other things that we would like to do. He stated that there have been other things that have occurred in other communities and they felt that it was a good thing to have an Auxiliary Officer here.

President Corcoran: Is there anybody else that would like to address Council this evening?

3) Bob Slovak of 7145 Case Road thanked Council President Corcoran for taking the time to help him with an issue regarding the new water meters and estimated bills. He stated that he resolved an issue with an estimated bill he received after the new water meter was installed. He also expressed his thanks to whoever put the nice addresses up along Center Ridge.

President Corcoran: Anybody else? Seeing none, moving on to the Administrator's reports, Mr. Mayor.

**ADMINISTRATORS REPORTS:**

**A. Mayor:**

Mayor Gillock: Thank you. First, you found at your desk this evening, two ordinances. These are both regarding BANs. The reasons we had made the decision to borrow the money during appropriations was, number one, build a 600,000 dollar sludge storage facility at French Creek as demanded by the EPA. The second one is for 225,000 dollars to replace a water main on Cook Road. I would first ask the Clerk to assign T numbers to these two ordinances.

President Corcoran: Mr. Mayor, does it matter at all which order they are in?

Mayor Gillock: No, it doesn't.

Clerk of Council Smith: The first one will become T 45-2010.

Mayor Gillock: Is that one for the 600,000?

President Corcoran: Yes, it is for the 600,000.

Clerk of Council Smith: The second one for 225,000 is T 46-2010.

Mayor Gillock: Thank you. The Auditor will be speaking more to these. These will be introduced by me.

                    moved by Mayor Gillock, seconded by Olesen to add these two ordinances to your agenda this evening under first readings

President Corcoran: Are there any questions?

Council Member Johnson: Mr. Chairman, we do have a Finance Committee report on the same issue. Are you asking me to withdraw the Committee report as we have the same issue here being duplicated? Finance Committee report number six on the agenda is the issuance of bonds and it is the same subject.

Law Director Crites: Mr. President, may I? Ms. Johnson, if they are indeed on the same topic and I didn't attend the Finance meeting, but I am glad you brought it up. We would simply require the motion this evening to suspend the By-Laws or at least that aspect of the By-Laws

that prohibits addressing legislation during the same meeting as the Committee Report is being introduced.

Mayor Gillock: That is what the motion was, was to suspend the By-Laws to add these to the agenda.

Law Director Crites: That is a good point, because actually, under Robert's Rules, if you suspend the By-Laws once in the beginning of the meeting, then you've suspended the By-Laws and all By-Laws thereunder for the rest of the meeting, but that is not typically how we practice here. We usually do it piece meal. They've been suspended. I don't know, for the sake of clarity, if you need to rephrase the motion, but they've been suspended and that would be no problem.

Council Member Johnson: I guess my question is, do you want me to withdraw the Committee Report?

Law Director Crites: There would be no need to. By suspending the By-Laws, the Committee Report still gets to appear on the agenda and be read and be part of the meeting. However, you will now be able to address the legislation also.

President Corcoran: Any other questions?

Council Member Boose: Can we clarify what the motion is, since we have heard a couple versions?

President Corcoran: The motion was to suspend the By-Laws to allow T 45 and T 46 to appear under first readings this evening. All those in favor say yes. All those opposed say no.

President Corcoran: T 45 and T 46 will appear under first readings this evening.

Mayor Gillock: Thank you. I have mentioned in prior meetings about the Columbia Gas Automated Meter Reading Installation Program. That program is now underway. I got my card. It says that Columbia Gas will be upgrading your service by installing our new meter. When will it happen? Approximately, two to four weeks. Who? Uniformed technicians. It takes about 20 minutes and it does not disrupt your service. You won't even know they are there unless you have an indoor gas meter. If you have any questions about it, please give us a call. There shouldn't be a problem again, unless you have an indoor gas meter, then they will contact you to gain access to that.

All you groups out there, the Lorain County Health Department has many health grants available. It is a program that they have that they will provide grant monies to groups such as Rotary, or Lions, or Kiwanis, or church groups, or work groups or any small groups. You can apply, but the maximum amount that they will award will be 500 dollars. There is an application program, but this could be used in a group to do an exercise program or an incentive program regarding health. If you are interested in this health grant, please contact this office and we can give you the specifics on it.

Lastly, a quote, "The census taker once tried to test me. I ate his liver with some fava beans and a nice Chianti." That is from Anthony Hopkins in the Silence of the Lambs. The reason I bring

that up is that we don't want you to eat our census takers because they will be coming around. You will be getting a letter soon with only ten questions on it. It is not a difficult thing to do but, we need you to fill those out and get them back because it is very important that the population count be as accurate as we can get it because a lot of our grants and the funds that we get are based upon population. A census worker may come knocking on your door as the official census date is April 15. If you don't return the form, I can guarantee you that they will be knocking on your door. You should first ask to see a photo ID and/or badge that shows they represent the Census Bureau. They will also have a hand-held device that is used to take in the information. They should have a canvass census bag and a confidentiality notice. They will not ask you for your social security number or any information about you bank accounts or credit cards. If you don't know who they are, I would advise you to have them remain outside if you are not comfortable with them. Again, never give out personal financial information. That is not the type of thing they are asking for. The information they do ask for is held highly confidential as federal laws prohibit them from even sharing the information with other federal branches. That is coming up a month from today. So, be prepared for the census letters or visitors. Thank you, that concludes my report.

President Corcoran: Thank you, Mayor. Safety-Service Director Armbruster.

**B. Safety-Service Director:**

Safety-Service Director Armbruster: Thank you, Mr. President. One item to report. Mr. Gaydash asked, during a Council meeting, a question regarding 35945 Center Ridge Road and how the process was that building got built. In the research that has been done, the Midtown Development Company went to the Board of Zoning and Building Appeals on April 28, 1977 and variances were granted. There were eight land owners around that piece of property that were notified in the process. They requested a variance of five feet on the side and also on the frontage. So, the proper sequence from back in 1977 was followed in going through the Board of Zoning and Building appeals. Hopefully, I can give you a copy of this research, Mr. Gaydash. I am just reporting to Council that is what happened in the process and we have learned that the usage was between the schools and the development company that allowed that to happen because they share that driveway between the Middle School and Midtown Development Company.

President Corcoran: Mr. Armbruster, did you have anything else?

Safety-Service Director Armbruster: No.

President Corcoran: Thank you, very much. Mr. Engineer?

**C. Engineer:**

Engineer Griffith: Thank you, Mr. President. National Wildlife Week and I might add that this has nothing to do with the census, sponsored by the National Wildlife Federation which extends

from today, March 15th to Sunday, March 21st. The first National Wildlife Week observance took place more than 70 years ago when kids spent time climbing trees, skipping stones, and running barefoot in the grass. According to the Kaiser Family Foundation, today's average child spends only four to seven minutes outside each day. Compare that to the astounding seven hours and 38 minutes per day the average child spends engaged with electronic media. Per Rebecca Garland, executive director of the Kaiser Family Foundation, "We're raising a generation of indoor children who are missing out on the simple joys found in nature. Our children need to know why they call it the great outdoors." Please encourage your children to learn, explore, discover and imagine the world of green and show them how the outdoors can be a favorite play space. That concludes my report this evening.

President Corcoran: Thank you, Mr. Griffith. Mr. Auditor?

**D. Auditor:**

Auditor Costin: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I have several items for Council this evening. The first of which, you should have received your Written Financial Report for the month of February 2010.

Secondly, under new business is T 42, which represents the initial annual appropriation ordinance for the city of North Ridgeville and I would request that be passed tonight with the emergency so we can be in compliance with the Ohio Revised Code that states it must be into effect by March 31, 2010.

Also, under new business are BANs, ordinances T 36, 37, 38, 39. The purpose of issuing these BANs is to pay off existing BANs, Bond Anticipation Notes that are maturing early in April of 2010. I would request that these be passed with the emergency as well.

Third, the Mayor, during his report, referred to the two ordinances that were passed out just prior to the meeting and during appropriation finance meetings. There were two projects of such significance that it was required that they be funded. By not having the ready cash to fund them, it was determined that we would issue Bond Anticipation Notes. Those two new BANs ordinances, T 45 and 46, should they be passed by emergency tonight; which I recommend, would be included with the other BANs and they would be issued in combination resulting in economic efficiencies to the City.

Finally, Committee Report 6254, which will be read shortly, represents a split change in the City's income tax allocation. This split change was necessary to fund the General Fund appropriations. An ordinance will need to be passed formalizing this reallocation and this reallocation is represented in the permanent appropriation ordinance that will be passed tonight. Without changing the split change, we would not have been able to fund the appropriation

ordinances because we would have had insufficient monies to fund the General Fund operations. I want to quickly put Council on notice that there will need to be an ordinance passed retroactive to January 1, 2010 that changes the income tax split. That completes my report.

President Corcoran: Thank you, Mr. Costin.

Council Member Buescher: Mr. President. Since the Administration is finished with their reports, I was wondering if I could make a comment. I don't know whether this would be under old business, but just regarding what Becky Campbell said during the lobby session. Because I think it is really important and again, I really appreciate that you came here tonight, because I know that even people outside of our City have commented with the economy the way it is, there was a concern . . .

President Corcoran: I'm sorry to interrupt, but are you talking about the dog park specifically that is going to appear under new business?

Council Member Buescher: I'm sorry, I could have mentioned it then. I'll wait then.

President Corcoran: Do you want to wait?

Council Member Buescher: Yes.

Council Member Boose: Mr. Chairman, two notes. This was presented through the Park and Recreation Commission at our last meeting and approved by them. My only question was whether or not the expenditure qualified for the improvement fund. For that, I will defer to the Auditor.

President Corcoran: Mr. Auditor?

Auditor Costin: I think he is referring to the fact that when we have these types of fees, it should be for the improvements of the parks and whether or not this constitutes a maintenance on this versus an improvement. Truthfully, not being at those meetings, I don't know what this entails.

Council Member Boose: This is a complete replacement of the sub panel that needs to be replaced. It is not only old and outdated, but it is now malfunctioning. So, it is in our opinion, it was an improvement, but wanted to make sure that you were okay with that.

Auditor Costin: If it is an improvement and it will extend the life of whatever it is that you are improving, then it would qualify as a proper expenditure.

Council Member Boose: Then it will. Thank you.

President Corcoran: Just as a reminder, it was moved by Boose and seconded by Butkowski to approve the request. All those in favor say yes. Those opposed say no.

Recommendation from the Parks and Recreation Commission to dedicate 3.5 acres of City property located off of Bainbridge Road for the development of a Dog Park

Council Member Boose: Mr. Chairman, I would move to recommend that this be referred to the Building and Lands Committee. The actual approval of this at the Park and Rec Commission was to dedicate up to 3.5 acres of City property for the development of the dog park in and around the Bainbridge Road area near the library. To say that it has to be, as this memo says, in the existing over flow parking area may or may not be exact. There is quite a bit of acreage there and I think one of the reasons why you may want to have it to Building and Lands is so that the Engineer's office can help with trying to identify specifically, where this needs to be, because there is a rather sizable ditch there. There is probably some water drainage issues there and you're going to have to also account for a driveway to get there; water and I don't know if you'll need sewer there. You'll need lighting and some stuff there and I don't know that we are capable of making that determination right now.

President Corcoran: Mrs. Buescher, did you want to comment?

Council Member Buescher: Thank you, Mr. President. When Becky Campbell clarified for us, the expense that would be needed for clearing and fencing in the area, I have to say, I appreciated hearing it, because I have heard from people from other cities concerned that 50,000 dollars is being placed in a dog park when the economics are so bad and so, this clarification is extremely important and I would like it to be on the record. Thank you.

President Corcoran: Thank you. Mr. Boose is right, there is a lot of questions that still need to be answered. The Chair will refer this to the Building and Lands Committee.

Council Member Boose: Mr. Chairman, all I would ask is that the Chairman of the Building and Lands Committee make sure that they contact the Friends of The Park, so that they could do their best to be there to answer as many questions as they can, because they have been spearheading this for over five years. So, they will have a lot of information on it.

President Corcoran: Absolutely. I think Mr. Olesen would be more than happy to have that happen.

As per the cover letter to the 2009 Annual Report for the Ohio Third Frontier; signed by Eric Fingerhut, Chair and Lisa Patt-McDaniel, Director indicates that SRI International completed an independent study of Ohio Third Frontier and related Ohio technology based economic development programs. Their report showed that since the inception, the Ohio Frontier through December 2008 had generated 6.6 billion dollars in economic activity in Ohio. It has created 41,300 total jobs. It has significantly impacted the diversity and competitiveness of Ohio's manufacturers. It assisted in the formation, attraction or initial capitalization of more than 570 companies and with an investment of 681 million dollars leveraged almost a ten dollar return of every dollar invested between 2003 and 2008 and again, as Mrs. Butkowski indicated, one of our own businesses in North Ridgeville, R.W. Beckett Corporation, received a million dollar grant for the development and commercialization of residential energy storage technology to store power collected from any source of electricity for later use. I don't think you can find a better bang for your buck than they have shown here during the past several years.

President Corcoran: Any questions or comments?

Council Member Boose: Mr. President, yes. The annual appropriation process is generally a long and stressful process in working through the City's financial situation and this year was certainly no exception. For almost three full days the Council Finance Committee met with the Mayor, Safety-Service Director and Auditor Chris Costin and his staff, to find a way to fund the necessary safety and service requirements of our City, as well as, end the year in a positive balance, which is required by law. Throughout those three days we were able to meet with every City Department Head to learn of their successes and challenges and discuss what each department could do to help in keeping expenses to a minimum, while not sacrificing critical safety and service issues for our residents. To that end, I want to acknowledge the preliminary work done by the Administration and the Department Heads in coming better prepared for the meetings with the Finance Committee than ever before. There was very little conversation of wish lists as we already knew we had to keep expenses to a minimum and in many cases, requested expenses for 2010 was at or near 2009 requests. But, even all of this preparation does not make the task of completing the budget for the entire City any easier. As every department within themselves have extremely important financial issues to address and most of them will not go away with an answer of, "wait until next year." We have several projects in lots of departments that we can't do because of the finances we don't have. Most of them are not things that we'd like to do, they are things that we have to do, that we just can't. That is why I would like to address at this moment, that waiting until next year, may not be a pretty story. In fact, it will probably be an even worse one for the year after. Several of us have been quoted; including Auditor Costin, that our finances this year are as challenging as any in memory. While the budget proposed in T 42 will end the year in a positive balance, I personally believe that it is still not enough in looking long term in the future of our City. This budget does look forward and let me again acknowledge the extraordinary ability and leadership of Auditor Costin and his staff, they continue to work miracles with the cards they are dealt. While it does look forward, I believe we need to cut even further than what this budget currently proposes. I want to acknowledge that all three of our unions, that pro actively and across the board, agreed to a voluntary wage freeze for 2010. But, with the largest single

expenditure in our books of salaries, is it enough? There were no salary increases approved in this budget, with the exception of a few step increases per the union agreements, which are generally earned by less tenured employees. But again, with employees and staff as the number one largest expenditure, is that going to be enough? Let's begin with understanding where we are today and where we anticipate being with the proposed budget at the end of 2010. At the beginning of 2010, we had a combined carryover in our General Fund and Income Tax Fund of approximately 3.4 million; 2.6 million in the General Fund. This current budget proposal shows a combined ending balance of only 1.6 million, with only 475,000 in the General Fund. That means that in this fiscal year, we will anticipate reducing our carryover by over 1.8 million. Now, remember carry-overs are necessary, not only as a hedge against emergencies and to pay for needs when our sources of income do not keep up with the growth of our community, but they also help us earn higher bond ratings when we go to borrow money. We tend to borrow money, our share, to fund many of our capital projects. Again, we are looking at reducing our carryover by 1.8 million. A simple math will show and I know you can't use simple math, but it will show that if you reduce your carryover by 1.8 million this year and only have an anticipated carryover of 1.6 next year, you are headed for trouble in 2011 at a minimum of 200,000. But wait, there is more. At the beginning of 2011, we already know that we will have approximately a quarter million dollars of one time retirement buyouts that will have to be paid. So, it increases our future expenses even more. Now historically, we have been able to not spend approximately 500,000 that has been appropriated. So, if we add that total to the calculation for each year, 2010 and 2011, we are closer to a break even analysis. But the problem with counting on that 500,000 is that we have already cut our budgets to bare bones and worse than ever before. So, I ask is there really another 500,000 to save? Again, I know that we have been able to do that in the past, but we've really cut down. Remember we have cut 48 percent of our original appropriation for salt purchases in order to save 175,000 in one line item budget; hoping for a mild March and November and December. So, if we truly anticipate that we will spend 500,000 less and we are truly looking for that type of spending, it is my recommendation that we go back to the review and find another 500,000 to cut before it is spent, because once it is appropriated, it can legally be spent. Let's look at the three replacement levies that are on the ballot in May. Between Police, Fire and Street levies combined, will generate over 4,000,000 dollars in needed revenues for our community. We've already debated the reasons for their replacement and they have been approved as replacements many times over. So, the need has never been in question. We must pass these levies, as without them, the money for required safety services and street repairs or replacements will need to come from; you guessed it, the General Fund and as you can see, the General Fund will not have an additional four million dollars to cover these costs. There is more. The sewer and Sanitary Improvement Funds are anticipated to have carryover balances of only 88,000 dollars; compared to 1.4 million at the beginning of the year without the previously discussed seven percent sewer rate increase. In 2011, where are we going to come up with the 1.3 million to cover the shortfall without the seven percent increase? Certainly, not the General Fund. Although the sewer increase was originally anticipated to begin, if approved, last month, I have not heard anything about considering it and it is not included in this budget. This, ladies and gentleman, could cause serious financial issues in less than one year

from now, if not addressed in 2010 and quickly. Again, the current appropriation legislation before us will end the year in a positive balance, but at what price in our future? Could some additional cuts this year, help loosen the impact of more major expense cutting in 2011 or 2012. It is difficult for certain and I'm not suggesting that it is an easy choice, but the choice that we make today is the choice that we have to live with in the future. Again, I give my kudos to Mr. Costin and his staff. They work miracles with the cards that they are dealt. I mean no disrespect with my commentary on what I believe are some issues that we need to address; rather now than later. If there is anyway in which we can help soften the blow this year, I believe we should strongly consider it. Thank you. President Corcoran: Thank you, Mr. Boose. We are going to stop for a moment to change the tape on the machine. Mayor Gillock, we are back on live.

Mayor Gillock: Thank you, Mr. President. Just a couple comments. I agree with the sentiment that Councilman Boose has laid out before us in his analysis. We did work hard on this budget with the Auditor's office. Jeff and I spent time a week before this process with our Department Heads and as I told one of the local newspapers, we have gone passed taking the fat out of this budget. We are down into the muscle now. I agree with his sentiments regarding the three levies coming up. They are replacements, but they have been in place for years. They do contribute over four million dollars to our bottom line and that is how important they are, but a couple of things that I want to point out that Councilman Boose may not be aware of. When we talked about cuts that could be made after the appropriation's hearings, on Tuesday; with the Streets Department, we sat down when we were done with his and cut almost another 900,000 dollars out of his budget and the biggest part of that was the salt. At the end of the appropriation's hearings, at 2:30 on Thursday, Jeff and I met with the French Creek Management and we cut another, almost 900,000 out of their budget, which goes toward the 1.3 million that Mr. Boose mentioned and is part of the capital expenditures. Six hundred thousand of that is the sludge barn that was approved earlier tonight that we are issuing BANs for and several of the other items we either delayed or moved into a maintenance budget. So, there is even additional cuts on top of what Council is aware of. Our employees and our Department Heads have stepped up and really made sacrifices. The one thing I don't want to sacrifice at this point is our employees and Mr. Boose made the recommendation that we go back and cut another 500,000 dollars out because it might not be there. I'm not in the frame of mind that I want to start laying off employees from our Police, Fire and Street Department because the budget might be tight. We know it is tight and as Mr. Boose has said, our Auditors have done a tremendous job in calculating and forecasting where we're going to be. I think we are comfortable with our numbers in where we are at now. We're not comfortable with what we have to do and what we can't do this year. But with the budget itself, we think we're right where we need to be and the Auditors have been historically very accurate in their predictions in where we are going to be. We are always very conservative. We've hit our marks or come in above them and I think we should go ahead and get this passed, get through this year, get our levies renewed, keep watching it as we do know. I would not support, at this point, trying to cut any more out of this budget, because as Mr. Boose said, the bulk of our budget is salaries and the bulk of

our salaries is in our Police, Fire and Streets Department. I don't think right now, we should be cutting those departments unless we had an absolute, black and white reason why we need to be doing that. Thank you.

Auditor Costin: I have a comment as well. Relating to Finance Committee Report 6254 again, which is a split. That is not up for us to vote on tonight, but, we actually did look at 90/10 and we actually did look at 92/8 and to fund the general fund appropriately, it was mandatory that we change that split to 93/7. Now, we do have additional monies in capital projects that are carried over from last year and that was based on an 85/15 split. It is highly likely that we will have a carryover balance sufficient in 2011 to have another 93/7 split. We are not going to have enough money in there because of the amount of debt service that we have, but I'm also comfortable that we have recommended that it is necessary that we do fund 93/7 this year and move on with passing the appropriation ordinances. However, our office certainly intends to monitor the expenditures and we intend to assist the Department Heads on cutting back, because it is obvious looking forward that even with the passage with these levies, it would still be very tight this year. Our revenues continue to shrink and that is putting the largest amount of pressure on our City as well as the communities around us. So, I would support and recommend that the City pass the appropriation ordinance in its present sense. We do still have some work to do obviously. I do have to remind you that the ordinance that we recommend you pass tonight does indeed reflect the 93/7 split. Otherwise our general fund ending balance would be insufficient. Again, this is looking into next year at our carry forward balances into next year and the amounts available for next year. It will be mandatory that with the passage of the appropriation ordinance tonight we do pass retroactive to January 1, our change in income tax split from 93 percent to seven.

Safety-Service Director Armbruster: Mr. President, I would also like to say that the Administration, both Dave and I are working together and as an example, when I sign the purchase orders, I look at the expenditures and get back to the Department Head and the Auditor's office. Just today, when we talked about French Creek sewer system and the water line, we wanted to make sure that we did more repairs rather than maybe replace it. He stated that he tried to get the Service Department to do that but unfortunately, it was too big of a job for them to do. Every Department Head in this community is looking at their expenditures, how they are spending the money, and if they can save money in any way. They are really looking at that. There isn't a day that goes by that this Mayor, next to me, doesn't say, "Is the expenditure right or is the expenditure wrong, let's spend it right and let's make sure that we understand how we are spending the tax payer's dollars." Not our dollars, the tax payer's dollars. Honestly, it is imperative that these three levies, police, fire and streets pass, as we did years ago. Year after year, as these levies come up after every five years, this is how this community has supported this government. It hasn't basically been coming through from income tax. It has been coming through the levies for specific purposes to support police, fire and streets. In that way, the residents are assured that their money is spent in those areas rather than going back to the General Fund to fluff up what other governments have done. We don't have the fluff here in North Ridgeville. We are working as we did when I was Mayor and going back that far, this building itself was repaired. It was suppose to last for five years. I left in 1994. We have made do and we plan on

making do in stretching out the dollars that we have available, but it is absolutely imperative that these three levies get passed. If they do not, unfortunately, we will have to look at the budget as to what kind of impact that has not only in 2010 but as it will impact us through 2011.

Council Member Johnson: I just want to thank everybody for their cooperation in the process in supporting this ordinance. The Mayor and the Department Heads and the Auditor's office. They all did an outstanding job and there is no fluff in this ordinance. I just wanted to say thank you to everybody for all their time. They did an outstanding job.

Council Member Boose: Thank you. I agree, Jeff, Mayor, Chris with everything that was just said. Chris and I went over this extensively the other day, trying to look forward, which is all something that we all have to do in your own household especially when it is your money. I don't take that lightly and so, when I look forward into 2011 and 2012 and one of the things that Chris and I have talked about is how we have been able to, even though we appropriate money, that we were able to not spend about a half a million every year. We've actually took that into account in our calculations, Chris, that looking to see that by 2012, that will break us even. Again, without these levies passing, that doesn't work. Without some sort of additional revenue; whether it be increase in building or housing fees or some other way, we are going to have to come up with something else to try to move forward. Mayor, if there were things that were cut from the budget that was after what we were talking about, I'd certainly like to see those revised budgets; especially for French Creek. Are you saying then, that we won't need to have an increase in sanitary sewer rates this year, because my understanding was, that if it was retroactive; even to February, it would be seven percent. It is already March, so, isn't that going to be more? I am trying to understand that.

Mayor Gillock: Mr. President, the 1.3 million is the maximum pay as you go CIP for next year. If we don't cut that down, we have already done a seven percent increase for this year that meets our needs. We're looking at next year and trying to look ahead to see where we are at. French Creek came in with a request at 1.8 million and we told them that they had to cut that down. We've got to get, at that point, 900 and some thousand out of their budget. That is reflected in the budget that you have here. You don't have the detail here.

Safety-Service Director Armbruster: Mr. President, might I add to the Mayor's comment is that CM2H Hill has the new reflective numbers for 2010 and also what we pushed off for 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015. They are doing some recalculations on the satellite sewer. Satellite sewer is what we charge Avon and Sheffield as well as our rates, which have to be the same. They have to be the wholesale rate. Those calculations are being done as we speak. We don't have those numbers. Now, if you remember in the projection, there was a seven percent that we already passed. It will be seven percent next year and then there were other projections that went out for each year thereafter. I don't have it in front of me. So, when CH2M Hill finishes with their calculations with their current 2010 budget numbers, it will then give us an absolute reflection when we go back to the satellite sewer, which has to be done every year with the other communities; our intentions are to meet with them early on to let them know how we've pushed off some of the capital improvements that we've done and that will possibly have an impact on that seven percent that was projected for 2011.

Council Member Boose: So that I understand, I know that we passed the wholesale increase of seven

percent to all three cities. It is my understanding that we still have yet to pass any increase to our residents to cover that seven percent increase. My question is, are you saying because of the cuts that you were able to make after appropriations with French Creek, that we will not have to have a seven percent increase to our residents.

Mayor Gillock: Mr. President, the 1.3 million that we are talking about is that we are cutting figures into next year's French Creek calculations and not this year.

Council Member Boose: So, this year, there is not sanitary sewer increase for residents?

Mayor Gillock: We don't know that. We have not completed the study. That 1.3 million doesn't affect this year's rates, which we are already working on. I will get you a copy of the capital expenditure report where we worked with French Creek, so you can see where we cut it. That doesn't affect the City's sewer rates right now. That CIP that we cut has to do with the French Creek wholesale rate.

Council Member Johnson: Mr. Chairman, I do have the revised list if I could just pass that over to Mr. Boose.

Council Member Boose: This is the revised from your's? I have that one.

Mayor Gillock: That one doesn't have the additional moves that we made on the French Creek budget.

Council Member Boose: The budget for this year shows that at the end of year we'll have 88,000 dollars in those two funds and it is my understanding that we always liked to have that fund to be about a million at a minimum, so that in case something comes up, which it always does, we'll be able to take care of it. I was under the understanding that we were going to have to talk about our residents having an increase in the sanitary sewer rates for 2010.

Safety-Service Director Armbruster: Mr. President, there has been no discussion with regards to our residential rates. The only thing that we've addressed at this point, is the wholesale rate to all three communities. It is up to each community, then; including North Ridgeville, to at that point discuss, if in fact, it is necessary to raise the retail rate or the consumer rate, the residential rate. And so, each community now, knows what the wholesale rate is going to be and if there is going to be a discussion, whether that takes place now or six months from now, it is up to city Council to have that discussion.

Council Member Boose: I guess that is why we haven't had that discussion, but I've had a discussion with Mr. Costin and it appears that again, at the end of the year we are only going to have 88,000 dollars in the fund. I don't see where that is enough.

President Corcoran: Mr. Costin?

Auditor Costin: I think I can clarify what is going on here. We have a two part study being done and annually updated. The first part is French Creek. The French Creek study was done and it included recommendation for our wholesale rates for this year, which was passed. When they did our rate study for French Creek, it was based on certain capital improvements and certain operating costs. We gave them numbers that they were to use in the projection for our cost for this year. When French Creek came in with their appropriations, they exceeded the numbers that we gave the engineers for our estimate. So, what the Mayor is referring to is the fact that we needed to go back and cut back the

costs to be at least no more than what we gave the engineers, otherwise, we would have a higher increase in next year's wholesale rate. That is not something that the Administration, the leaders of this City want to do if we can avoid it. That is that issue. The second issue that Mr. Boose is referring to is the fact that we still need to address our own city rates. It is my understanding that, that will be done once the second part of our study has been completed, which it hasn't yet. The engineers should be updating now, our study, to incorporate the estimated cost for 2010 as well as the passed through rates from French Creek. That summarizes this entire conversation that I think we are getting into way too much detail for this body. It was discussed at Finance. That hopefully summarizes and answers both questions here.

President Corcoran: There is a motion on the floor by Johnson and seconded by Butkowski to add the emergency to T 42. We've had plenty of discussion, but I will ask one last time, is there anything else that anyone would like to say? Clerk, please call the roll on the emergency.
