It's hard to believe summer is coming to a close and the kids are back to school. With our schools in session so are the school buses traveling our streets picking up and dropping off

Stopping for stopped school bus

2 or 3 Lanes:

Two-lane roadway: When school bus stops for passengers, all traffic from both directions must stop.

Two-lane roadway with a center turning lane: When school bus stops for passengers, all traffic from both directions must stop.

Many of you may recall the news reports regarding the rash of drivers illegally passing school buses. I would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that passing a stopped school bus is ILLEGAL in North Ridgeville. Currently, there are no areas of the City in which the school buses will be picking up or dropping off students that would allow drivers to pass approaching



from the opposite direction. The Ohio Revised Code 4511.75 also states drivers "shall stop at least ten feet from the front or rear of the school bus and shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion, or until signaled by the school bus driver to proceed." When in doubt, STOP!

Also, as a reminder, according to the Ohio Revised Code 4511.21, the speed limit in school zones is 20 mph during recess and during the opening and closing hours of schools. Please pay attention in order to keep the children in our community safe!

With all of the construction happening in our City, I would also caution drivers that utilize Ranger Way as a cut-through from Center Ridge Road to Bainbridge Road, that the school district will once again be closing off access on Ranger Way from 7:30-8 AM and from 2:30-3 PM each day to accommodate bus and parent drop-off and pick-up. Please use Lear Nagle, Root Road (southbound traffic only) or Avon Belden during this time.

In the spring 2018 issue of the *Community Connection*, I shared with you two commercial projects – Danbury Senior Living and The Avenue at North Ridgeville. We have taken a number of calls at City Hall inquiring as to when these facilities will open for business. Danbury Senior Living located at 33770 Bagley Road at Lorain Road is slated to open in early 2020 and will offer independent living, assisted living and memory care. They are currently taking reservations for their North Ridgeville location by calling (440) 596-3797. The Avenue at North Ridgeville is located at 6200 Lear Nagle Road and is also expected to open in early 2020 and will offer nursing and rehabilitation services. Inquiries may be directed to Carl Holbrook at (330) 401-7581 through the end of October followed by calling their local number beginning in November at (440) 353-0066.

#### Ohio Utilities Protection Service - Call 811 Before You Dig



City Hall from time to time will receive calls from residents that arrive home to find flags or surface markings on or near their property. These flags/markings are used to indicate the location and route of buried lines in preparation for digging. The uniform color code is as follows: Red = Electric; Yellow = Gas/Oil; Orange = Communication/Cable; Blue =

Water; Green = Sewers/Drain Lines; Pink = Temporary Survey Markings; Purple = Reclaimed Water/Irrigation; White = Proposed Excavating.

If you plan to dig, the Ohio Revised Code states that "at least forty eight hours but not more than ten days before commencing excavation, the excavator shall notify the protection service of the location of the excavation site and the date on which the excavation is planned to commence." Call Ohio Utilities Protection Service (O.U.P.S.) at 1-800-362-2764 or 8-1-1. This applies to not only excavators but residents that plan to dig or demolish any structure including post hole digging, landscaping, sign installation, etc. For more information, visit the O.U.P.S. website at: www.oups.org.

### **City Ditch Maintenance**

Stormwater runoff is any form of precipitation, such as rainfall, which flows across the surface of the ground. As water flows overland, it picks up fertilizer, oil, pesticides, sediment, litter, bacteria and other pollutants and carries it to the City's ditches and streams. Excessive rainfall, much like the City had experienced this past spring, increases flooding and erosion, reduces water quality, and creates costly problems to communities and their residents. Unlike water from toilets, showers, and sinks that is filtered through a wastewater treatment facility, runoff that enters catch basins, storm sewers, roadside swales, and tributaries which does not flow through a water quality measure goes untreated into the City's ditches and streams, and eventually into Lake Erie.

Blockages of ditches and pipes are frequent causes of flooding in North Ridgeville. Over time, ditches can become overgrown with vegetation. The overgrown vegetation combined with the accumulation of sediment and trapping of debris decrease the hydraulic capacity of the channel. This can lead to flooding problems in upstream areas. In an effort to address flooding, erosion and water quality problems, the City routinely inspects ditches to ensure they are functioning as intended. A properly maintained channel will carry runoff from most storm events. On January 1, 2019, the City assessed a stormwater utility fee for all residential and commercial property owners. This fee is intended to fund inspections, maintenance, operations, and any necessary improvements to the City's stormwater system.

The Service Department is responsible for the maintenance and cleaning of roughly 75 miles of ditch lines throughout the City of North Ridgeville. The efficient operation of this vast network of ditches and streams is essential to a well-functioning stormwater management system.

Ditch maintenance generally includes the removal of overgrown vegetation and accumulated sediment and debris to maintain the optimum depth and slope of the channel to maximize its drainage capacity. Once restored to their original shape, ditches are re-seeded to stabilize the soil and minimize erosion of the embankment. Open ditches with maintained grass are preferred in order to maximize capacity and provide erosion protection as well as a natural filtration system.

Residents can help maintain a well-functioning drainage system by keeping all debris, including leaves and grass clippings, out of ditches and storm drains. As a reminder, it is illegal to dump leaves, grass clippings, litter and other debris into the drainage system or in a location, such as a roadway, where debris could be swept into the system by stormwater.



The City will only maintain ditches and streams that are identified on the City of North Ridgeville Ditch Map and that have not been incorporated into a development. If a ditch lies within an easement, then whoever the easement is deeded to is responsible for maintaining the ditch. Home Owner Associations (HOAs) are responsible for maintenance of on-site detention basins and any associated drainage easements outside of the public right of way. In all other cases, property owners are responsible for maintaining swales, yard drains, and storm sewers that reside on their private property.

If you believe a ditch or drainage pipe is clogged and creating flooding problems in your area, contact the City's Service Department at (440) 353-0814. All requests for blockages will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis.

### Special Leaf Collection, October 29-November 26

Leaves may be placed at the curb in plastic bags beginning October 29 through November 26 on regular trash pick-up day. After November 26, leaves in plastic bags can only be left out as extra trash each month during bulk pick-up. From April through October each year, yard waste must be placed in brown yard waste bags for weekly collection.
